Learning to Love Myself

Lisa – SafeHouse Graduate, Amazing Community Activist, and Dog Mom*

I am originally from the Midwest, and prior to coming to San Francisco was in an extremely abusive relationship. Although I'm a licensed cosmetologist, I was actively engaged in prostitution. My ex-boyfriend was physically and financially abusive which made it hard for me to maintain my self-esteem and sense of self-worth. In order to cope, I started using drugs; when I would try to stop using he would bring drugs around to keep me hooked. He verbally abused me and made me feel like I deserved little as an African American Woman. It was a hard situation and, although they tried, I was unable to get the emotional support I needed from my family. I made several attempts to go to college but was unable to finish because of the abuse and our transient lifestyle.

I eventually moved to San Francisco to escape the drugs, abusive ex-boyfriend, and prostitution. I thought I could make a fresh start. However, due to the high cost of living, I ended up homeless and on the streets. I didn't know my way around, and was looking for work and attempting to use the shelter system to get on my feet. It was a very scary time in my life. I saw a lot of drug use, violence, and sexual assault while living on the San Francisco streets.

Fortunately, all of that changed when I came to SafeHouse. I no longer had to worry about finding food, being safe, or wondering where I was going to sleep at night. I didn't have to try to seek help all over the City. I had everything I needed at SafeHouse. I started therapy to work on my issues and self-esteem and was able to save money and do fun things that I hadn't done before. I was able to get out of my comfort zone and do things that were new and positive. Because I didn't have to worry about things like paying utility bills and household supplies, I was able to really focus on myself.

SafeHouse made me feel secure about myself and my sexual orientation because I was in a safe place where I was treated fairly. They allowed me the opportunity to work through my internal issues, and become whole.

My life is very full now. I started working part-time shortly after entering the SafeHouse program. The part-time position eventually became full time and I recently picked up an additional part-time job with a pharmaceutical company. Thanks to the staff's help getting me on housing lists, I now live in a beautiful one bed-room apartment in the heart of San Francisco. I am getting ready to go back to school, and am actively volunteering in the community. SafeHouse helped me to believe in myself. I feel so very lucky to have been there.
